CHARACTER QUALITY:**T R U T H F U L N E S S**

He or she is genuine and has a reputation for being good and **TRUTHFUL**.

While some opposites use the prefix “un-” to designate the opposite (as in TRUTHFUL / UNTRUTHFUL). Other opposites (antonyms) are created by adding the prefix “dis-“. Read the clues below and try to think of which words are being considered. The vowels are missing from the root word, but the consonants should help make it easier to solve.

Example: Someone who tells the truth can be described as this—or not:

Have you (or someone you know) ever said "no" when you (or someone) really wanted to say "yes" ?



GETTING AT THE TRUTH, when a situation occurs, usually is helped by having more than one single view. Your idea of what has taken place or about an item is limited . . . so is everyone else's ! When you're an **EYE WITNESS** to an event or if you've studied a subject, it's good for you to share what you have seen and experienced. Your angle, or your perspective, in relation to the incident or subject is an important contribution to what needs to be known. It's also good to remember that your **POINT OF VIEW** may be different from another's. We need to share information *respectfully*.
